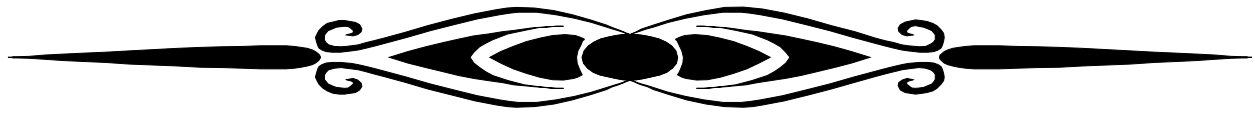

Secretary's Report

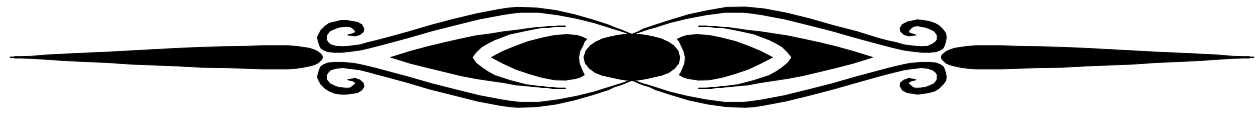

Chief Executive Officer's Report

As my sixth report to the membership, 2009 has been the most challenging year to date for The Ontario Soccer Association, particularly as a result of the introduction of a new information system. This has impacted every aspect of The Association from the Board to the local community club. In fact, this initiative has become a flashpoint for many of the concerns regarding any of the service programs offered by The Association. The intent of the new system was to provide The Ontario Soccer Association with one of the most advanced and integrated sport management systems in the world. The ultimate goal of the system was to reduce the administrative workload by the end user, thereby enabling all to afford more time to the development of soccer in Ontario and ultimately Canada. Unfortunately, we have not been able to achieve the goal of successfully launching a new system. This is something which we recognize the inconvenience and the source of frustration for all users. The level of frustration has been extreme but also in some respects understandable, but in others has not. It is also understood that this has impacted the internal credibility of The Association to deliver services to the membership. It is our vision that once the system is in place, the benefits of the new administration and information management system will become evident and tangible. However, on behalf of all of us who have worked on this project, we recognize the frustration which the implementation of the new information system has caused and regret the inconvenience to our membership and users of the system.

Our Results

Financially, 2009 was a very strong year as The Association continued to achieve positive results during a global recession. The balance sheet is reflective of such with a Total Fund Balance of \$5,310,000 which is inclusive of general operations of The Ontario Soccer Association, Ontario Soccer Centre and the Hall of Fame and Museum. For 2009, The Ontario Soccer Association (inclusive of the Hall of Fame) generated a surplus of \$533,000 and the Ontario Soccer Centre maintained a healthy surplus of \$259,000, for a combined total of \$792,000.

Again, this year we continued to achieve the objectives identified within the strategic framework based upon its principles of organizational development, volunteer development, soccer technical development, promotion and sustainability. The results of these initiatives are published on our website.

We continued to build upon a communication platform with the introduction of OSATV, an on-line project utilizing the YouTube portal. This also includes OSATV Touchline, an interview format program. Within the scope of the YouTube 10-minute interviews, OSATV received 10,171 channel views and OSA Touchline, 4,902 channel views, all in a period of less than 4 months.

This year we implemented the distribution of major news items in a weekly distribution list of over 700 recipients. Supporting organizational development to enhance and assist the administrative capacity of the soccer community, we have worked with eight districts and 71 clubs through the organizational development unit and the Club Excellence program respectively.

Recently, we announced the hiring of a new Chief Technical Officer to provide support for creating a new vision and implementing a series of initiatives to achieve this vision. The primary focus will be to ensure that participation in soccer is a positive experience through efficient coach development programs supporting both recreational and competitive players. The introduction of the Canadian Soccer Association's Wellness to World Cup strategy will provide the cornerstone for future development.

As stated previously, the success of any sporting organization is what is achieved on the field of

play. Recently, eleven Ontario female athletes were selected to Canada's National Under-17 Women's Team to play in the qualification round for the 2010 Women's U-20 FIFA World Cup. With a dramatic penalty shoot-out win over the United States, the team qualified for the World Cup; and then with a 1-0 victory over Mexico, the team won the CONCACAF Under-17 Championship. This team is the only Canadian team to qualify for a World Cup in 2010. A major part of this success was the leadership provided by Bryan Rosenfeld, (Manager of Player Development and Provincial Teams) as Head Coach and Paulo Pacione, the OSA's Strength and Conditioning Coach.

Highlights

Registration:

- 377,387 outdoor registrations - 1.9% decrease from 2008
- 85,032 indoor registrations, including futsal players - 6% decrease from June 2008
- 462,419 total registered players with 18% playing indoor/futsal - overall 2.6% decrease

Provincial Team Program:

Provincial All-Star teams at the U14 and U16 age groups had success in the Canadian Soccer Association's sponsored All-Star competitions and Canada Games winning medals in each division:

Ontario had 37 players at the Under-17 and Under-20 age groups representing Canada in International competitions.

Referee Development:

- 10, 979 registered referees - 7% increase
- 5 referees were appointed to medal games at National Club Championships
- 1 referee was appointed to National Referee Badge
- 4 referees were re-appointed as FIFA Referees or Assistants
- 38 referees participated in national Level competitions
- 4 referees appointed to MLS competition
- 8 referees appointed to FIFA competitions

Coach Development:

289 courses held for 6,228 coaches at Youth, Senior, Child, and Pre -B, Advanced, B License and Goalkeeper levels

- 126 Child Courses
- 86 Youth Coaching Course
- 62 Senior Coaching Courses
- 3 Advanced Coaching Courses
- 10 Pre "B" Courses
- B License - 40 participants attending
- Goalkeepers Course - 28 participants
- 20 Districts involved with clinic activity that encompassed approximately 120 communities across the province
- Annual Coaching Conference with approximately 700 coaches in attendance

Ontario Soccer Centre:

- More than 275,000 people using the Ontario Soccer Centre
- Installation of a dome provided additional training for provincial teams
- Contracted by Maple Leaf Sports and Entertainment Limited regarding facility booking at BMO Field and Alan A Lupton Stadium
- Provided assistance and support for various clubs, districts and communities regarding facility development and operation

Competition and Events:

- 804 teams participated in various Ontario Cup Competitions – outdoor, indoor and futsal
- 110 different competitions were hosted by 78 different clubs/districts throughout the province
- Over 1,300 games were played
- The Ajax Soccer Club won 5 Outdoor Ontario Cups
- The Quebec/Ontario Cup was hosted for the second year

Futsal:

- The Futsal Committee has developed a strategy framework to increase the capacity of the game with a focus on coach, player and referee development combined with an awareness campaign.
- The OSA Referee Department developed and introduced futsal referee courses in 2007, to provide education and on field training in answer to the demand from people expressing interest in officiating futsal games.
- Plans are currently underway to hold a new futsal course for new referees, to be unveiled during the Fall of 2010
- Between the months of October and December 2009, 7 futsal courses were run by The Ontario Soccer Association in Ajax, Waterloo, Ottawa, North York, Sarnia, London and Sudbury.
- Approximately 100 individuals received their futsal referee certificates or were recertified with all clinics instructed by certified OSA futsal instructors
- Futsal coaching certification program is the next priority and is currently under discussion with The Canadian Soccer Association.

Challenges

The Ontario Soccer Association is a diverse and multi-facet organization serving an equally diverse soccer community. The implementation of the new information management system has impacted the confidence of the membership. A future focus will be required for the development and execution of a quality level membership support program. While small, the decline in registered numbers, particularly at the youth level, is a reflection upon fees and the level of benefits of the services provided. Furthermore, as an Association there is an overwhelming need to address the relationship with private sector suppliers who have become an integral partner in the soccer delivery system particularly in the area of facility development.

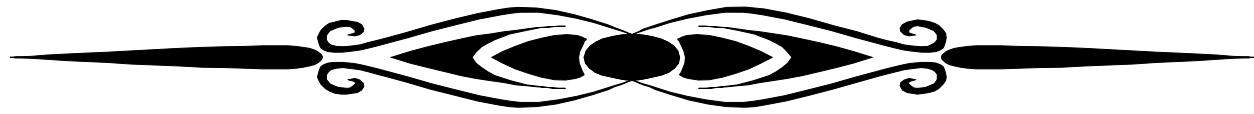
Outlook

The above challenges will impact the outlook for soccer in Ontario for the next several years. While there is growth in the interest of soccer, the delivery of the game is changing in Canada as a whole and the impact will affect the Ontario system. There will be continuing growth in soccer participation with an increased influence of Major League Soccer in Canada upon the system. Our industry is maturing and as a collective we will have to re-visit as to how we provide services to the soccer community. In 2010 we will be launching a review and re-renewal of our strategic framework that will entail visiting all districts, meeting with leagues and seeking feedback through internet surveys. This will be both a comprehensive and inclusive exercise for participants.

Conclusion

I would like to recognize all of the staff at the league, club, district and home office for their time, energy and commitment to improving soccer in Ontario. To the many volunteers who serve as board members, committee members, coaches and club leaders whose dedication and commitment is responsible for our continued success. Your contribution is appreciated and recognized by all, you are the heart and soul of The Ontario Soccer Association. On behalf of the Board of Directors and staff of The Ontario Soccer Association, we are excited about the future of soccer in Ontario, and I thank you all for your continued support.

Treasurer's Report and Financial Statement

Introduction

In 2009, The Ontario Soccer Association's financial position and operations continued to improve, building on the work and progress of the past few years. We are in a very strong financial position. The audited statements are certified by PKF Hill, LLP and in keeping with past years, contain an unqualified opinion. I will be recommending at the AGM that we appoint the auditing firm of PKF Hill, LLP for the 2010 year.

When you read through and review the financial statements of 2009 in comparison to 2008, because of the decision of the Board to change our fiscal year to the end of December 31st of each year it is difficult in this financial review to compare our actual revenues and expenditures. You will see that the 2008 financial statements are a 9 month year, versus a 12 month year report for 2009. The balance sheet however represents a point in time and is a fair comparison. We should always remember that the balance sheet is a good financial indicator of the health of an organization. As you can see when you review the financial statements of the Ontario Soccer Association we continue to have a sound balance sheet.

Financial Strategy and Financial Position

Reflecting back on our 2006 Strategic Framework documents and initiatives, a key component of success for the OSA was and is defined as "Sustainability". In conjunction with our Financial Department Staff and our managers of their respective departments we set a financial cash target of \$1.4 million which was to be achieved by 2010. As a reminder this cash target was based on 3 months of fixed costs for the OSA and 4 months of fixed costs for the Soccer Centre.

I am very proud to announce that this goal has been achieved. This achievement is a result of my predecessors and staff putting in place financial controls and processes of monitoring our expenses and revenues on a regular basis. The board has received updates and progress reports on a regular and consistent basis. In addition to achieving this "cash" goal the OSA has invested in the following infrastructure since 2006:

- A new turf field for Soccer Centre (\$504,000)
- The installation of a dome over a portion of the Outdoor Turf (\$721,000)

Currently, we are in the process of renewing our Strategic Plan for the next three to five years. Even though our cash target has been reached and our financial status is sound, it is time to update and renew our financial strategy moving forward. We still have some debt that we need to consider. We have \$706,000 outstanding in promissory notes that need to be paid back. The long term portion of the Mortgage on the Soccer Centre of \$2.8 million expires in 2017. We should be thinking now of how we are going to support our clubs, districts and leagues when we are debt free. When the debt is eliminated it will be an excellent opportunity for the OSA to consider investing back into the organization in areas such as facility development, coach development, district development, organizational development, reducing fees etc.

With respect to our financial position the key message that needs to be conveyed to the membership is one of strength. Our total assets are \$10.2 million which represents a

growth of \$600,000 through 2009. Our Fund balance of \$5.3 million represents growth of almost \$800,000 in 2009.

Major Variances to Budget

Our financial statements show an overall surplus of \$792,000. The results are impressive against the backdrop of the downturn in the economy and the tough economic times throughout the province. These results have allowed us to invest in a Chief Technical Officer and move forward to support the Long Term Player Development model. I have highlighted some positive and negative variances which I believe are important in reviewing and discussing.

Positive Variances (\$792k)

- \$250k - Corporate - more revenue than planned - primarily the OSA's portion of international game receipts and savings from the vacant staff positions in 2009
- \$150k - Coaching - Greater clinic revenue and management of clinic expense
- \$140k - Referee Development - Greater registrations and a reduction in expenses by staff
- \$120k - Player Development - 2 government programs helped pay for some expenses
- \$70k - Soccer Centre - installation of the dome and increase in non-prime time rental
- \$45k - Member Services - Organizational Development below budget

Negative Variances (\$260k)

- \$100k - Information Systems (Creation of new website, extension of contract with previous registration supplier and work on the new AIMS program). A full detailed report will be provided by our CEO at our AGM on May 1, 2010
- \$55k - Reduction in player registration fees collected (8,000 less outdoor registrations)
- \$45k - Competitions - Fewer entries (Ont Cup, Futsal, etc), greater Ont Cup expense, Futsal investment
- \$30k - Corporate - reduction in ministry funding
- \$30k - Corporate - OIG Governance Review project (not budgeted but approved by Board)

Closing Remarks

I cannot overstate how fortunate we are to have the dedication and commitment of Tony Nacev, Ron Kenny, and Rose Ciarrocchi who continue to perform an outstanding job. Whenever I have needed information or clarification they have always responded to my requests. Also, within any budget process you need the dedication of the Managers of each Department to provide detailed reports and justifications of their own departmental budgets and remain within the parameters approved by the board. Our Managers have done an exceptional job in this regard.

I also want to thank our Finance committee of Naurice Baldwin, Robert Vizzaccaro, Liana Flabiano, Mack Meloche, and Tammy Eskildsen. Last but not least I want to thank the previous Treasurers of the OSA for setting the course and working with the leadership of our CEO and staff.

The economic outlook for the future remains uncertain. Society is slowly recovering from an economic downturn and we need to keep our financial strategy flexible and vibrant as we move forward. I am very confident that the financial controls, processes and measures we have put in place over the past four year period will serve us well moving into the future.

As you may remember, I mentioned in the fall of 2009 the need for a "Financial Summit" with all the Provinces to review and investigate new revenue sources and financial opportunities. A meeting was scheduled for April 24, 2010 however not all the provinces could meet the timeline. As such they have agreed to move this summit to the fall of 2010. The CSA will be part of this process. It is imperative that in these upcoming discussions we remove or re-align some of or all of the burden of expense off the recreational player base and look for new revenue opportunities.

In closing, from a financial perspective I believe we need to continue to review and prioritize our programs and services. Our membership has been asking us to undertake this complex and detailed process. This should be a priority of the Board moving forward.



1. Purpose of the organization

The Ontario Soccer Association ("Association") is incorporated in Ontario and is defined as a not-for-profit organization under the Canadian Income Tax Act. The Association is exempt from income tax under Section 149(1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act. The objectives of the Association are to promote and regulate the sport of soccer in the province of Ontario.

2. Basis of presentation

These financial statements present the financial position of the Association as at December 31, 2009 and the results of its financial activities and its cash flows for the period then ended. The prior year's comparative figures include activities for the 9 month period ended December 31, 2008.

3. Summary of significant accounting policies

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, the more significant of which are outlined below.

Principles of consolidation

These consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Association and its controlled organizations, The Soccer Centre (Ontario) ("Centre"), Play Soccer and the Hall of Fame. The Centre, Play Soccer and the Hall of Fame are defined as not-for-profit organizations under the Canadian Income Tax Act. The financial positions of Play Soccer and the Hall of Fame are included with those of the Association (note 4).

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements, in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. The Association makes estimates for the allowance for doubtful accounts, useful lives of building and equipment as well as the realization of deferred revenue. Actual results may differ from such estimates.

Financial instruments

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants ("CICA") provides a temporary choice for financial disclosure and the Association has chosen to continue to apply Financial Instruments - Disclosure and Presentation, Section 3861 in place of Financial Instruments - Disclosure, Section 3862 and Financial Instruments - Presentation, Section 3863.

The Association's financial instruments are comprised of cash, investments, accounts receivable, accounts payable, notes payable and long-term debt. Cash is stated at fair value. The carrying value of investments, accounts receivable and accounts payable approximate fair value due to their short-term maturities. The notes payable and long-term debt are recorded at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

It is management's opinion that the Association is not exposed to any significant credit, currency, market or interest rate risk.

Property and equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided over the estimated useful lives as follows:

Building (constructed on leased land (note 5(a)))	40 years straight-line
Dome - air structure	15 years straight-line
Dome - gradebeam	40 years straight-line
Indoor turf	10 years straight-line
Outdoor turf	10 years straight-line
Outdoor turf facilities and equipment	20 years straight-line
Play Soccer equipment	3 years straight-line
Furniture and equipment	5 years straight-line
Computer equipment	30% declining balance

Revenue recognition

Player registration fees and program fees are recognized when billed. Clinic fees and competition fees are recognized when the service is performed. Revenue is recognized from sponsorships, rentals and agency fees over the term of the contract. Concession sales are recorded on the date of sale. Monies received in advance are recorded as deferred revenue and recognized when earned.

Contributed services

The work of the Association is dependant on donated services of many volunteers. Since these services are not normally purchased by the Association and due to the difficulty in determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in these consolidated financial statements.

Members of the Board of Directors are volunteers who serve without remuneration.

Future accounting changes

The CICA has not issued any new accounting standards which the Association will be required to adopt in the next fiscal year.

10. Objectives, policies and processes for managing capital

The Association's capital is comprised of the net amounts invested in property and equipment, internally restricted and unrestricted funds.

The Association and the Soccer Centre invest in property and equipment in order, primarily, to provide facilities for the soccer community. The Association's Board of Directors and the Soccer Centre's Board of Directors are responsible for the investment, and define the policies to be followed to ensure the smooth functioning of the facilities and their maintenance.

A reserve fund has been established by the Centre's Board of Directors to finance future repairs and replacements for the Centre. An annual amount of \$50,000 is reserved for this purpose. Only major repairs and replacements are charged directly to this fund. Minor repairs and replacements are expensed either through the unrestricted fund or recorded as property and equipment, according to their nature.

The objective of the Association and the Centre is to maintain an unrestricted fund balance sufficient to meet both the annual working capital requirements and the annual maintenance of property and equipment. Management prepares the annual budget and cash flow forecast to meet the requirements of the unrestricted fund. After the budget is approved by the Association's Board, the Finance Committee and staff monitor the actual results against forecast.

The Centre has covenants with both the City of Vaughan and the CIBC which include maintaining the fund balances at deemed values and maintaining a fixed charge ratio. The Centre and the Association submit financial statements to the CIBC on a quarterly basis, and to the City of Vaughan on an annual basis. It is management's understanding that the Centre is in full compliance with all covenants.

Notes to Financial Statements

Period ended December 31, 2009

1. Incorporation

On September 30, 1997, The Soccer Centre (Ontario) (the "Centre") was incorporated in Ontario by its parent organization, The Ontario Soccer Association (the "Association"), and is defined as a not-for-profit organization under the Canadian Income Tax Act. The Centre is exempt from income tax under Section 149(1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act. The objective of the Centre is to provide a facility to promote the sport of soccer.

2. Basis of presentation

These financial statements present the financial position of the Centre as at December 31, 2009 and the results of its financial activities and its cash flows for the period then ended. The prior year's comparative figures include activities for the 9 month period ended December 31, 2008.

3. Summary of significant accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, the more significant of which are outlined below.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements, in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. The Centre makes estimates for the allowance for doubtful accounts, useful lives of building and equipment as well as the realization of deferred revenue. Actual results may differ from such estimates.

Financial instruments

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants ("CICA") provides a temporary choice for financial disclosure and the Centre has chosen to continue to apply Financial Instruments - Disclosure and Presentation, Section 3861 in place of Financial Instruments - Disclosure, Section 3862 and Financial Instruments - Presentation, Section 3863.

The Centre's financial instruments are comprised of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and long-term debt. Cash is stated at fair value. The carrying values of accounts receivable and accounts payable approximate their fair values due to their short-term maturities. The long-term debt is recorded at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

It is management's opinion that the Centre is not exposed to any significant credit, currency, market or interest rate risk.

Property and equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided over the estimated useful lives as follows:

Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized from sponsorships, rentals and agency fees over the term of the contract. Concession sales are recorded on the date of sale. Monies received in advance are recorded as deferred revenue and recognized when earned.

Future accounting changes

The CICA has not issued any new accounting standards which the Centre will be required to adopt in the next fiscal year.

8. Objectives, policies and processes for managing capital

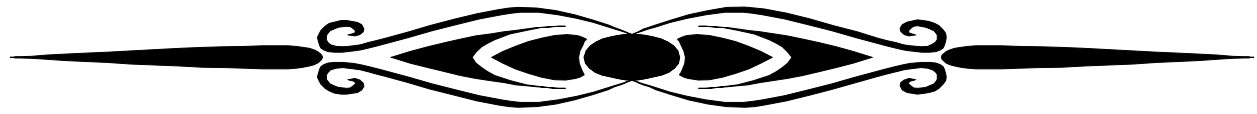
The Centre's capital is comprised of the net amounts invested in property and equipment, internally restricted and unrestricted funds.

The Centre invests in property and equipment in order to provide facilities for the soccer community. The Centre's Board of Directors (the "Board") is responsible for the facilities. The Ontario Soccer Association's Board of Directors and the Board are responsible for the investment, and define the policies to be followed to ensure the smooth functioning of the facilities and their maintenance. Purchases and financing requirements are approved by the Board as part of a multi-year plan.

The internally restricted fund is set aside by Board resolution to provide for future major capital purchases for the Centre. An annual amount of \$50,000 has been reserved for this purpose to be transferred from the unrestricted fund. Only reimbursement for major capital purchases are charged directly to this fund. Reimbursement for minor capital purchases are charged to the unrestricted fund.

The Board's objective is to maintain an unrestricted fund balance sufficient to meet both the annual working capital requirements and the annual maintenance of property and equipment. Management prepares the annual budget and cash flow forecast to meet the requirements of the unrestricted fund.

The Centre has covenants with both the City of Vaughan and the CIBC, which include maintaining the Fund balances at deemed values and maintaining a fixed charge ratio. The Centre submits financial statements to the CIBC on a quarterly basis, and to the City of Vaughan on an annual basis. It is management's understanding that the Centre is in full compliance with all covenants.

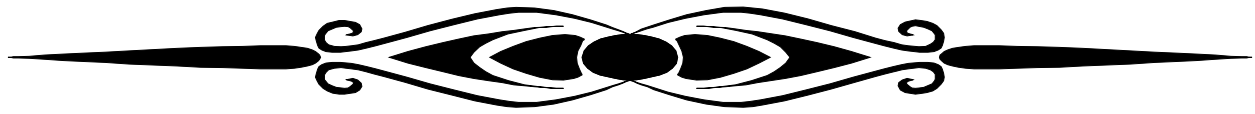

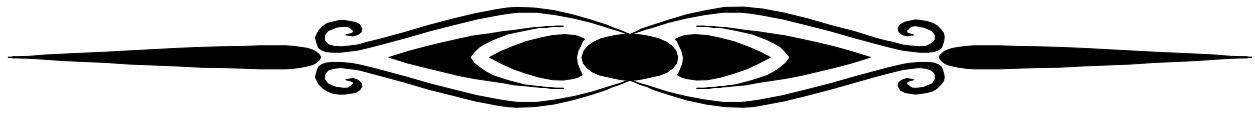

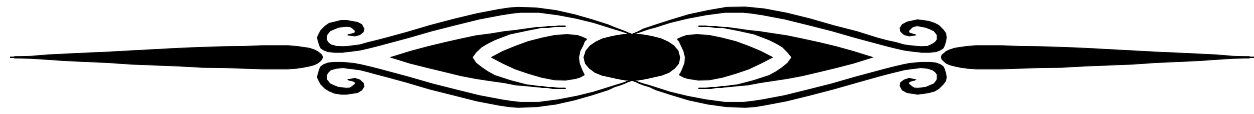

This year the committee also assisted in running the Ontario Futsal Cup. The Men's division was hosted by the Ottawa Carlton Futsal League, in conjunction with their 20th anniversary, and was held at the Carleton University complex. The Under16 Girls and Under 14 Boys divisions were held at the Hoop Dome in Downsview Park, North York.

The committee was successful in sanctioning two leagues under The OSA umbrella; one from Sudbury and one from London. The increase of affiliation between leagues and The OSA is necessary to continue development towards International Competitions such as The Pan Am games, hosted by Toronto in 2015.

The year 2009 saw the first Toronto International Soccer Show in which the committee participated. This soccer show was very entertaining and brought great exposure to Futsal. The committee and staff were able to network and promote the history of Futsal in Ontario and offer support on where to find more information about the game and leagues in Ontario.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the committee members, Bob Tibbo, Kris Fernandes, Roy Blanche, Tony Harrison and our staff member Chantal Poulin whom have worked collectively providing support and guidance toward the growth and development of Futsal.



League Management Committee

The OSA League Management Committee comprises:

- the Chair, appointed by the OSA Board (Walter Eadie)
- the Chairs of the North, South, East, West and Central Regional LMCs
- two members appointed by the Chair from applicants (Paul Dobson and Diarmuid Salvadori)
- (non voting) representatives of each of our L1 Leagues (OSL, OWSL, OYSL, OISL)
- and is ably supported by OSA Staff (Cathy Watt)

The League Management Committee has had an active agenda and 6 meetings since the last AGM report in November 2008. Even though Committee calendars are set 12 months in advance, attendance at some meetings has been poor. One meeting had no quorum and only one meeting had all Regional LMC chairs in attendance.

The following are the key accomplishments of this League Management Committee:

- The annual October LMC meeting now includes representatives from all L3 Youth Leagues, providing the only forum for all major amateur leagues in the province to meet and discuss issues of mutual concern. This format has been a success and should be continued.
- The Published Rules of all L1 and L3 leagues have been reviewed (in cooperation with the Discipline & Appeals Committee) and requests and/or suggestions have been made to the leagues on how to bring their rules into conformity with OSA Policies and to correct other questionable areas. This cooperative, as opposed to punitive, approach has been well received by the leagues.
- LMC responded to concerns from the leagues over the practice of 'call-ups' of suspended players. LMC worked with D&A to change OSA Policies to prevent suspended players circumventing their suspension by playing as a call-up.
- LMC has clarified the right of clubs to 'decline promotion' for a team moving up a level in the Pyramid, while giving the leagues the right to set their own rules on placement of teams within different divisions of any given level of the Pyramid.
- The 'North Region Challenge' process has been reviewed and revised to eliminate inequities which surfaced at the end of the 2009 season.
- LMC worked with OSA staff to revise League Policies, separating a league's annual Application for Associate Membership in OSA from its Approval of Terms of League Operations (TOLO). Further, a proposal has been made to adjust the required dates in the TOLO process (particularly for Indoor) to create more realistic timelines for the leagues.
- the terminology for Senior Leagues has been changed to be consistent with that of Youth Leagues (Levels 1 to 7)
- LMC continues to work on a revision to the application and approval process whereby a senior team gets permission to play in the United States (e.g. PDL and W-League).

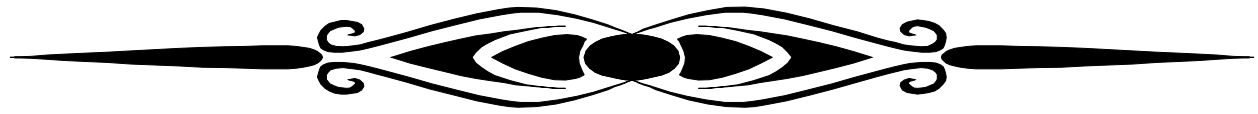
The League Management Committee has had an interest in, and involvement in, the study of Elite Youth Player Development since the Nov 2007 AGM. A Discussion Paper was released in

June 2009 by a Subcommittee headed up by Bill Spiers who has worked tirelessly to keep this issue in front of OSA and the Board. Unfortunately, no action has yet been taken and it is to be hoped that the appointment of OSA's Chief Technical Officer will finally prompt action in this important area.

I have been a member of LMC since 2003 and Chair of the Committee since 2007. I will not be seeking reappointment when my term expires at the end of this year. I'd like to thank my fellow committee members over the years for their support and assistance. I believe I am leaving the committee in better shape and with much better cooperation between the leagues and the committee than in the past.

My work would not have been possible without the support of Cathy Watt. Her responsiveness, attention to detail, and capacity to get the work done has made life infinitely easier for all of us on LMC committees (both Provincial and Regional). Thank you Cathy.

Ontario Cup Committee

In 2009, many successes were achieved in the Ontario Indoor Cup, Ontario Futsal Cup, Ontario Cup, Masters/Classics Provincial Championships, National Club Championships and the Coupe Quebec-Ontario Cup. The 2010 Ontario Indoor Cup and Ontario Futsal Cup also provided Provincial Titles to a number of teams.

In the Ontario Indoor Cup 2009 there were 141 teams entered in the Competition in Under 13 to Under 18 Boys and Girls Divisions. Most of the preliminary rounds were played at the Soccer Centre in Vaughan while six preliminary rounds were played in Ottawa and three in London. The Final Rounds were played at The Ontario Soccer Centre over three weekends in January and February.

The Ontario Futsal Cup 2009 consisted of 21 teams in four divisions; Under 14 Girls, Under 16 Girls, Men and Women. The Under 14 Girls and Under 16 Girls divisions were played at the HoopDome at Downsview Park in North York and the Men and Women played at RIM Park in Waterloo. Thanks to the help of the O.S.A.'s Futsal Committee, the Cup was successful in producing 4 provincial futsal champions.

The Ontario Cup Competition in 2009 began with 638 teams registered for play. Based on the maximum number of players allowed to register per youth team (18), the participation reaches a figure of over 11,400 players.

The Committee has discussed the format of the tournaments rounds, and it has been noted that we are restricted in this area due to the number of host organizations in each District Association as well as game officials. This year, in the Ontario Cup, 2 divisions had to be reverted to knock-out rounds due to a shortage of hosts. Nevertheless, there were 104 tournaments played in the Ontario Cup involving 57 different Clubs in Ontario.

In 2009, over 1100 games were played in a period of just over 120 days. Based on 3 refs per game, that would mean that over 3500 referees also participated in the Ontario Cup this year. All the Semi-Final games were played on the weekend of August 29-30, 2009, thanks to the assistance of 5 different District Associations; Scarborough, South-West Regional, North York, Peel Halton, and Sault Amateur as well as other volunteers of The Ontario Soccer Association. In fact, this year was the first time ever that the Ontario Cup Semi-Finals were held in Sault Ste. Marie and despite the wet rainy weather, the Sault Amateur Soccer Association did an excellent job of hosting the event.

The Ontario Cup Finals were held at The Soccer Centre in Vaughan, Ontario, on the weekends of September 12-13 and September 19-20, 2009. This year, the Special Olympics division was played again as part of the Finals, but for the first time, both Division A and Division B five-a-side teams participated in the event, producing two Special Olympics Champions.

The 2009 National Club Championships were held over Thanksgiving Weekend and the Under 14 Girls and Boys divisions played in Sydney, Nova Scotia, while the Under 16's were played in Winnipeg, Manitoba, the Under 18's in Sherwood Park, Alberta and the Men and Women in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. The Classics Over-35 Nationals were held in Edmonton, Alberta. Meanwhile, The Ontario Soccer Association hosted the Masters National Club Championships at The Soccer Centre in Vaughan.

Also over Thanksgiving Weekend, the second annual Quebec-Ontario Cup was held. The provincial league champions in Ontario played a two game series against the provincial league

champions from Quebec. The male teams travelled to Quebec to play, while the female competition was held here in Ontario and played at the Soccer Centre in Vaughan. Ontario teams played well in Quebec and Ontario, but overall, the Quebec-Ontario Cup was won by Quebec in the male competition and the female competition.

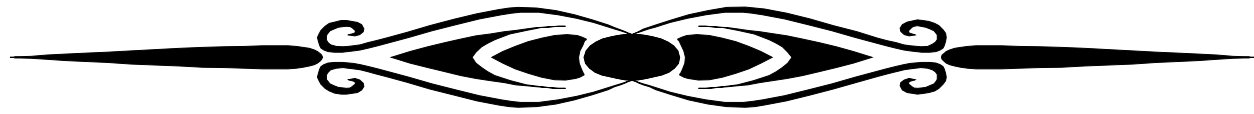
In 2010, a new year brought with it new competitions. The Ontario Indoor Cup 2010 began in December 2009 and produced 12 more Provincial Champions by the end of February. There were 114 teams entered in the Competition in Under 13 to Under 18 Boys and Girls Divisions. Most of the preliminary rounds were played at the Soccer Centre in Vaughan while two preliminary rounds were played in Ottawa, one in London and for the first time, a preliminary round was held in Thunder Bay. The Final Rounds were played at The Ontario Soccer Centre over three weekends in January and February.

The Ontario Futsal Cup 2010 consisted of 19 teams in three divisions; Under 14 Boys, Under 16 Girls, and Men. The Under 14 Boys and Under 16 Girls divisions were played at the HoopDome at Downsview Park in North York. The Men played at Carleton University in Ottawa, helping to celebrate the Ottawa Carleton Futsal League's 20th Anniversary. Thanks again for the help of the O.S.A.'s Futsal Committee in producing 3 provincial futsal champions.

In closing, I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to all the parents, coaches and players who participated in these programs. I would also like to thank all the volunteers, host personnel and game officials, as well as the OSA staff members who generate and manage all phases of these competitions.

These competitions are one area in soccer where everyone works together.

Referee Development Committee

Firstly I must acknowledge the tremendous work Andrew Backer and the Referee Department staff has undertaken during the past year. Even though with the staff turn over we have had this year, the delivery of the programs was not greatly affected.

This year's focus was continuing with the implementation of the CSA Guidelines and Regulations for Referees, and making sure the internal OSA procedures were in place. Some of the key achievements met this year were -

- The role out of the OSA Referee Development Operational Plan
- Development and implementation of a standardized District Referee Coordinators job description
- Gaining the Provincial division appointments of the OSL
- Development of the new standardized game fee chart for implementation in 2010
- 4 New Instructor Training Workshops & 4 New Assessor Training Workshops
- 1 Advanced Instructor Recertification training session
- Preparation of the new OSA Advanced Referee Training Program for launch in 2010

We have achieved all our targets and deadlines that were set out in our operational plan and continue to be in line with the CSA guidelines and regulations.

After the successful pilot of the new Mini Soccer referee course and CSA entry-level course in 2008, we had a successful full launch of these referee courses in 2009.

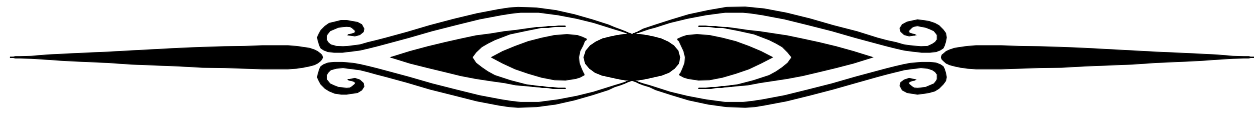
Another ongoing initiative is the appointment of referees at the Senior Provincial level. 2009 saw the addition of the OSL Provincial divisions under the responsibility of the OSA. This meant that besides the OWSL the OSA manages all the Provincial appointments in Ontario. I must acknowledge the strong cooperation with the Canadian Soccer League that has developed, which is assisting in appointments at the top level.

Specific Futsal referee training and registration was continued province-wide, which requires all referees who wish to officiate Futsal games to complete a Futsal Referee course and register with the OSA. This year saw two new leagues join the OSA community which meant the OSA working hard with these groups to bring on board new referees that these groups had on board. The Committee is looking forward in working with the CSA in 2010 to launch a Nation wide Futsal Referee Training program.

The OSA hosted the Eastern Masters Club Championships and 12 Ontario referees were appointed to this tournament as part of the officiating team. Both the Tournament and referees were a huge success.

I also wish to acknowledge the contribution of the many people across the province - instructors, assessors, district referee coordinators, club head referees, schedulers and many more! - whose time and effort are given freely towards the OSA referee program.

My thanks to the referee development committee members, Eric Sanderson, Patty Peebles, Joe Piacente, Al Wielinga & Tony Camacho for their invaluable guidance.

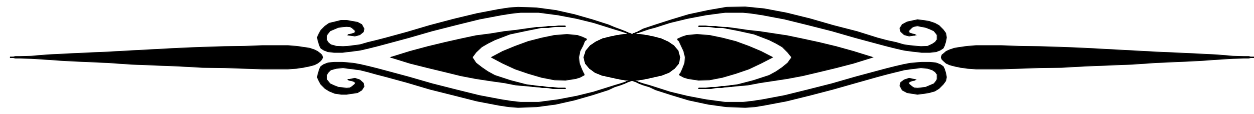

Volunteer Screening and Harassment Committee

In 1997, the Government of Canada passed two laws that impact programs involving minors (Under 18) and those that are vulnerable - ***Duty of Care*** and ***Vicarious Liability***. Unfortunately over a decade later, we still have clubs and districts that have not accepted the reality of their legal responsibility as it applies to minors and those that are vulnerable. As elected officials within your own jurisdictions, you must screen your volunteers. This is not a choice; this is, in fact, a requirement by law.

The OSA members approved the OSA Volunteer Screening Policy and Procedure many years ago, and yet, we are still dealing with clubs, and districts that are not screening their volunteers. Effective screening does reduce harassment complaints. Effective screening, along with effective policies/procedures, ensures you are doing what is reasonable to comply with the legal principles that have been upheld by the Supreme Court of Canada. The Harassment Prevention/Volunteer Screening Committee members conducted two training workshops per year and also review the Harassment and Screening Policies to ensure the contents remain current. As Districts it is your responsibility to ensure your clubs comply with the Policies and to take the necessary measures to deal with those that remain not compliant. This is not a responsibility that can be delegated up to the OSA Corporate office. This is yours' and yours' alone

Duty of Care, Vicarious Liability and Duty to Report (this is a personal legal responsibility) should be the foundation from which your programs/services radiate. These legal requirements should be front and center on every website within your jurisdiction as a confirmation that you are serious about providing a safe environment for all your participants. To do less can seriously undermine all the benefits your Association has brought to your community.

The Harassment Prevention/Volunteer Screening committee members are available to help you get the message out. We can also connect you with other Districts, who have embraced their legal responsibilities, to provide guidance. We have Clubs who also are available to help.

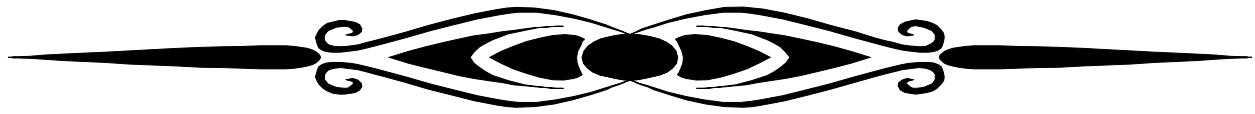
The last, but not least, line of responsibility lies with the OSA Board of Directors. You alone have the responsibility to deal with Districts who are not compliant with the legal requirements. You can no longer defer your fiduciary duties on this very serious issue. The Harassment Prevention/Volunteer Screening committee extends our assistance to you in developing some options/procedures for your consideration.

We sincerely encourage all of you to include Risk Management as an agenda item on your future board meetings - whether you are a club or a district or the OSA Board. Risk Management awareness, in all its forms, must be part of your day-to-day service delivery - you owe it to your members!

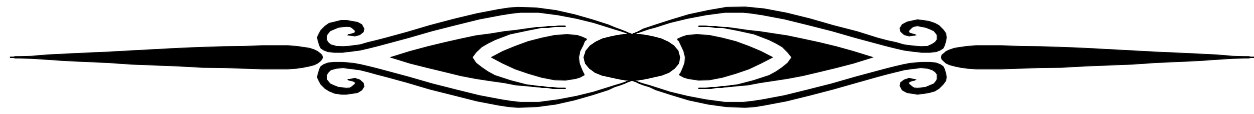

Governance Task Force

In 2009, the Board of Directors approved the recommendation of the Governance Task Force to work with the Institute of Governance (IOG) in conducting a survey and detailed interview process with board members, staff and stakeholders, which occurred over the summer months. The final report from IOG was brought forward to the Board of Directors for approval at the September Board meeting of 2009. The Board approved the report and the Governance Task Force has been working towards completing these objectives,

As a reminder the Institute provided 7 recommendations. They are:

- Revise the development process and content for board meeting agendas;
- Improve board engagement at and between meetings;
- Clarify, and agree on the Role of the Executive Committee;
- Clarify, confirm and reinforce the roles and responsibilities of both individual board members and the board;
- Clarify and adapt the OSA's current committee arrangements to better serve the interests of the OSA;
- Create a nominations committee;
- Consider opportunities to educate districts on the role and value-added of the OSA, as well as the Roles and Responsibilities of OSA Board members.

Within these seven broad recommendations, IOG recommended the following priority next steps:

- Allocating time to each agenda item and adhering to the times allocated;
- Set up a Task Force to review and recommend to the board the best option for reducing or eliminating board meeting times dedicated to RFD's and or RTD's;
- Institute post meeting written evaluation. Include in the evaluation a request for input from all board members into the next meeting agenda;
- Set up a meeting Conduct Task Force to include the President, Secretary and several representative Board members. The purpose of this Task Force would be to research and explore options and bring forward to the full board a draft policy on meeting conduct (rules of order);
- Explicitly confirm that the OSA board members role is one of oversight and strategic direction and not one of management;
- Provide training for the chair of the Board on meeting protocols etc.

One of the challenges for the Governance Task Force has been the ability to work with the Executive Committee and Human Resource Committee on some of these objectives as there is overlap in many areas. Some of the easy fixes of the report have been implemented with respect to agendas, communication, education etc. Governance is a journey, and requires continuous focus in an Association of our size and structure. Due to the size and complexity of our roles and responsibilities lack of focus or "drive" to get tasks completed has been an issue. To address this issue I requested that the three committees (Task Force, Human Resource and Executive) meet to bring our thoughts and processes together. Our President Clive Wilkinson was able to arrange and coordinate this meeting on April 9, 2010 and we have now begun to form common goals and relationships which were outlined in the IOG report. Clive was able to secure an excellent facilitator in the person of Clyde Healey a specialist in the areas of Board Structure and Governance, clarity of Roles and Responsibilities of Board members, working with staff etc. We believe we are now in a position to achieve significant progress towards improving our effectiveness and efficiency

as a Board. We will bring back to the September 2010 Board meeting defined next steps and recommendations of the remaining items identified in the IOG report.

We as a Board in conjunction and cooperation with staff must undertake and always be aware of the following eight (8) "Governance Tasks". They are:

1. Defining and ensuring good performance at the Strategic level
2. Developing and pursuing a longer-term agenda
3. Building strong stakeholder relationships
4. Anticipating and managing risk
5. Ensuring financial and organizational health
6. Rendering account
7. Maintaining a sound governance system
8. Reviewing CEO performance

In summary, Governance is defined as the process whereby organizations like the OSA make their important decisions, determine who has voice, who is engaged in the process and how account is rendered. Good governance exists where those in positions of power are perceived to have acquired their power legitimately, and there is appropriate voice accorded to our membership who is impacted by our decisions. Many times we receive information from our members who are disappointed with our decisions (or lack of) and ineffective communication strategies. Further, the exercise of power results in a sense of overall direction that serves as a guide to action. Our membership has been reminding us that they see no sense of direction.

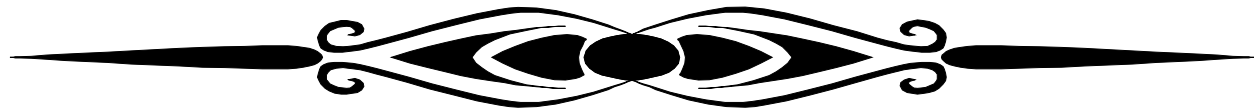
Good Governance should result in performance that is responsive to the interests and well-being of our membership. In addition good governance demands accountability between those in positions of power and those whose interests we are there to serve. Accountability cannot be effective unless there is transparency and openness in the conduct of work being done. Finally Governance should be fair, which implies conformity to the rule of law and the principle of equity.

To ensure good governance, all the principles mentioned above need to be embraced and present in our daily deliberations. There maybe conflicts and friction as we move forward however as a Task Force and Board working together with our Executive and Human Resource Committees, our staff, and our membership, we need to identify and find a balance that works for the best interests of our Association.

We are on a journey "together".

The Task Force looks forward to the "opportunities" that lie ahead and the "challenges" that we will resolve together.

Medical Advisory Group

Following are some of the key issues addressed and managed by the Medical Advisory Committee in the past year:

1. Injury Report of the 2008 – 2009 Provincial Program

As in past years, a recent report was published on the OSA web site outlining where most of the injuries reported to us were for our Provincial teams for 2008 – 2009. Our results were similar to previous years where most of the injuries fell into 3 categories as follows: ankle, leg soft tissue, and knee. One of the notable changes is in the category of female ACL injuries which have dropped from previous years. Much of this improvement with reducing the number of ACL injuries could be due to a concentrated effort by our High Performance department and the Sports Centres in changing the training techniques to help the body prepare for the various demands with the game of soccer.

2. Renewed Medical Advisory Committee

We have also revised the list of members serving on the Medical Advisory Committee this year. An effort is always made to ensure that the key medical professions are represented which would provide the most help with the management of the athletes.

3. Paediatric conference Report

I had the opportunity to attend a 1 week symposium addressing the management of common and more pressing issues affecting our paediatric athletic population which in Ontario is defined as ages 1 to 18 years. Such emerging issues as early onset type 1 and 2 diabetes, asthma, communicable disease, infection control measures etc were covered by the symposium. Leading authorities from the University of Michigan and North Carolina participated in the presentations. A full overview of the symposium can be seen on the OSA website.

4. Advances made by some of our committee members

It is worth noting that one of the Advisory Committee Members now practices Law in the field of Sports Medicine and its related issues. Congratulations to Dr. Ken Berger in completing his degree in Law. He is also licensed as a Medical Doctor with a specialty in Sports Medicine through CASM.

5. Integration with Teaching Institutions for Service Provider: Sheraton College, University of York, University of Waterloo, Guelph Humber University, Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College

We continue to maintain an integrated and varied group of health care providers for our High Performance provincial athletes here at the Ontario Soccer Centre. We have athletic therapy grads and students, kinesiology and exercise physiology grads and students and chiropractic grads and students from the above teaching institutions. As the High Performance Provincial Program is a development program for young aspiring soccer players so is the service provider pool. Many of the relationships the Sports Centres maintains with the above institutions include co-op programming and

volunteer programming. This allows us to monitor and improve our health care programs which we offer to our athletes as things change throughout the health care delivery system.

6. Assessing Budget Options for Health Care Coverage of the Provincial High Performance Program, Coaching Clinics, Christmas and March Break Tournaments

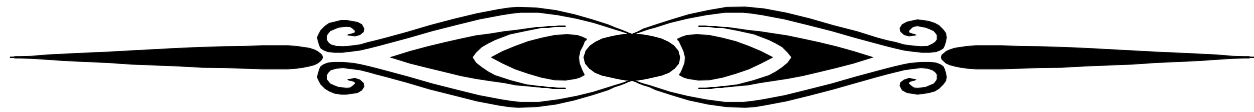
The medical advisory committee continues to review current funding opportunities available for the delivery of health care for the provincial program and looks for new opportunities as they arise from both the public and private sector. Much of the public funding is tied to maintaining certifications and licensing at various levels with our service providers such as with the Canadian Sports Centres-Ontario where the service agreement has just been renewed for an additional 2 year period.

7. Future Considerations

The following areas will be addressed over the next year by the Medical Advisory Committee:

- Improvements to the Sports Medicine Clinic at the Ontario Soccer Centre looking at funding to update some of the equipment and diagnostic equipment.
- Reviewing the effectiveness of our treatment and rehabilitation programs for athlete injury recovery.
- Reviewing the health care coverage provided to our athletes who are part of the regional and provincial programs throughout the province.
- Improving the injury reporting system to ensure that our tracking system provides the Ontario Soccer Association with the most up to date information possible.

I would like to thank our committee members for their dedication and time. I would also like to thank the Ontario Soccer Association for both its support and assistance in making this committee a viable and productive group of advisors. In particular Guy Bradbury and Bryan Rosenfeld for their advise and direction over the past year.

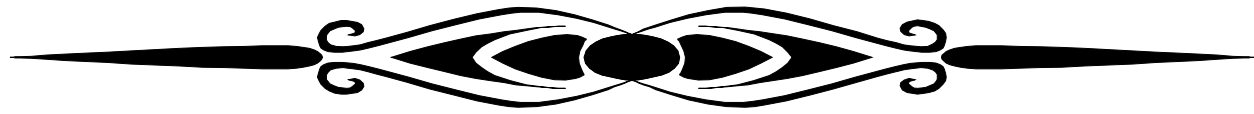

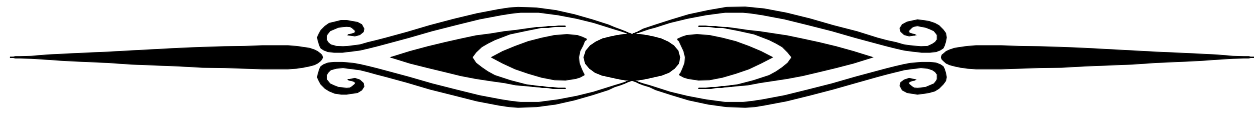

Eastern Ontario District Soccer Association



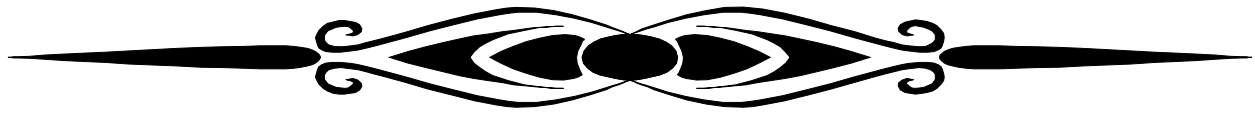

The Ontario Soccer Centre

The Soccer Centre is now in its thirteenth year of operation, and it continues to be one of Canada's premiere soccer complexes. The indoor facility has operated at 100% capacity during the prime time hours for the past eleven years, and the usage rate for the off hours of the facility continues to increase. There is no doubt that soccer has become a year round sport, and that the The Soccer Centre has become a year round facility.

All of the successes of the facility are attributable to the user groups, and this includes representatives from across the entire province. Over 350,000 visitors make their way through the site on an annual basis, and they participate in events which range from organized soccer, to touch football, to trade shows, and to commercial shoots.

In November of 2009, the biggest expansion in the thirteen year history of the facility was undertaken with the construction of a dome covering one third of the existing outdoor artificial turf surface. This project was delivered on time and on budget, and has met all operational expectations. Continued upgrading of the facility includes a \$150,000 grant from both the Provincial and Federal levels of government for roof repairs, and the construction of a storage area for the dome in the off-season. The Soccer Centre has in place the appropriate funds and policies to ensure that the facility continues to operate effectively, and maintain its current status within the soccer community. On an annual basis, \$100,000 is contributed towards a reserve fund to allow for major capital replacement projects.

For the period ending December 31st, 2009, The Soccer Centre realized a net income of \$260,000, and currently (May, 2010) the outstanding loan stands at \$2.9 million. At the present rate, the entire loan, including the promissory notes, will be retired in October of 2017, at which point the facility will be realizing an annual positive cash flow in excess of \$1 million. Any statement about the financial success of the The Soccer Centre must acknowledge the contribution of our incredible partner, the City of Vaughan.

In addition to the management of The Soccer Centre, The Ontario Soccer Association has partnered with Maple Leaf Sports and Entertainment in the operation of both BMO Field and Lamport Stadium. The OSA had undertaken the role of Community Bookings Agent for BMO Field in 2007, and with the transfer of the dome to Lamport Stadium, this role has continued on at the new facility. Guidance on issues related to all aspects of soccer facilities has become a major focus of The OSA's facility department.

In sum, The Soccer Centre continues to be a success from both a financial as well as an operational perspective, and there is every reason to expect that this success will continue for many years to come.

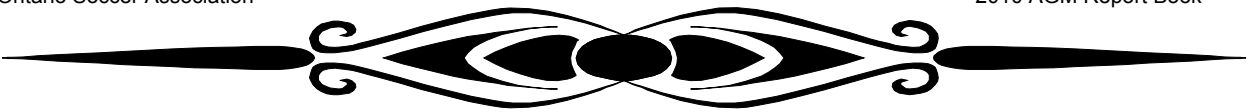

The Soccer Hall of Fame and Museum

After the Hall of Fame founding chairman Bill Hoyle stepped down in October 2009, I was appointed in his place. Only with that responsibility does one fully appreciate the amount of work that Bill applied in keeping the Soccer Hall of Fame functioning. His over 20 year involvement was recognized with:

- A presentation by the Ontario Soccer Association
- A plaque in the Hall of Fame
- Renaming of the Ontario room as the William Hoyle Room
- The June Callwood award for exceptional volunteerism
- Life Member of the Canadian Soccer Association

Bill is still fully committed to the Soccer Hall of Fame. As Chairman Emeritus, he acts as an advisor, hosts visitors, mans displays, researches information and provides assistance whenever asked.

The Board of Governors has undergone other changes. Sadly, long time stalwart Doug Knott passed away, and his incisive reasoning and desire for action will be greatly missed. After many years on the Board, Ed Grenda and Laurie Bell resigned. Terry Quinn remained on the Board, though not as a Canadian Soccer Association representative, and two new CSA reps were appointed: John Knox (who has been an important liaison with the CSA) and former national team manager, Les Wilson who has shown much enthusiasm & initiative. John McGrane also joined the Board to help represent all former internationals, and Cesar Velasco, a coach with Markham Soccer Club and marketing coordinator with Toronto FC, came aboard to provide a professional perspective. We are delighted that John Vanderkolk, Lynne McGarrigle and Guy Bradbury continue to serve.

Bill was instrumental in getting the Soccer Hall of Fame and Museum established and in providing a sound footing. Our aim now is to take it to the next level, to expand our displays, to encourage donations of memorabilia, to solicit financial contributions and to generate a higher profile. We believe eventually, that with the momentum soccer has, we can join the ranks of the longer established sports museums in Canada.

We are delighted to have our first full time paid staff member, Kim Watson, joining in April 2009 as Project Manager for our digitization programme, a direct result of our 3-year \$225,000 Trillium Grant achieved mainly through Guy's efforts. Kim also serves as curator. With the initial assistance of intern Lisa Hughes, and later the part-time paid help of Chantal Poulin, huge strides have been made in organizing and cataloguing our collection and getting it ready for on-line use. We have taken over a spare office near the lobby for use as a work area and new Soccer Hall of Fame signage has been added to the lobby.

Working with Charles Cameron, efforts are being made to revamp the website. The Soccer Hall of Fame purchased "The Soccer History" website from Colin Jose. Michael Smith is updating this content with the ultimate aim of combining the two.

Peel Halton District once again made a significant financial contribution, as did Lou Moro's estate. We are now in the process of planning to actively solicit Sponsorships and partnerships.

Our public profile and media coverage increased, and now there is a regular Soccer Hall of Fame section in "Inside Soccer" magazine. We made audio visual presentations to the OSA, the CSA Board/AGM, the Coaching Conference, the Ontario Referees Association, Eastern Ontario District AGM and have plans for a booth at the Toronto International Soccer Show in January 2010. We have a substantial and continuing display in the Rogers Room at BMO Field and Board members were featured on various video clips for OSA TV and TFC TV.

Colin Jose & I attended the US Soccer Hall of Fame Induction in Oneonta, New York. Impressed with the facility and the people but its future is uncertain.

With the considerable help of John McGrane we are seeking to actively involve former national team players. In this respect, special plaques recognizing the 1986 achievements were presented to each of the players and staff by Les Wilson, kindly funded by the Canadian Soccer Association.

Our 10th annual Banquet was a tremendous success, again, at the Golf & Country Club, stage managed by the OSA's Robyn McComb, Robyn Gmeindl and Rob Ferrari. Many believe it is the Soccer Event of the Year, sophisticated but entertaining. Inducted were builders Colin Jose, Bob Sawtell, Derek Wisdom, players Neil Ellett, John Limniatis, Joan McEachern, Mike Sojanovic, Pioneer Ted Slade, and the 1986 World Cup squad was recognised as the Team of Distinction. Gerry Dobson from Sportsnet again was the perfect MC. There were over 25 former Canadian internationals in the audience and the Ontario Minister of Health, Margaret Best and the president of the CSA also attended. The CSA bought 2 Banquet tickets for each member of the 1986 squad. The auction raised over \$2000 for the Soccer Hall of Fame. CBC filmed the reception and BMO Field intro for use on their Soccer Day in Canada TV special.

The Soccer Hall of Fame was given prominence at TFC games, and the Inductees were introduced on the pitch prior to the TFC -LA Galaxy game and presented to the press in a Meet & Greet. As usual the Inductees were given a tour of the Museum at a Friday Night reception with John McGrane as the lively host.

For future Banquets, we believe we should seek a larger venue in the downtown area. There will be a diminishing number of Inductees in the forthcoming years and we need to consider ways to maintain and increase audience levels. We will investigate the possibility of a keynote speaker, new awards and collaboration with the CSA with regards to recognizing national team players. Tom Anselmi, COO of MLS&E has agreed to be Honorary Chair for this year.
